1.0 Policy

We endeavor to create a commonwealth of schools within the Detroit Public School system which includes quality choice schools. Several of the schools within the commonwealth will be public school academies. In accordance with the Detroit Board of Education Public School Academy (Charter School) Enabling Resolution passed February 17, 1998, the following policy is recommended by the Interim General Superintendent and established by the Detroit Board of Education on _____ 1998:

1. All applicants must demonstrate how schools will expand or create educational programs not offered within the K-12 system in Detroit. All applicants proposing a program for 16 to 19 year olds must demonstrate the manner in which schools will address alternative education programs.
2. All applicants must provide a student recruitment plan including grades to be served.
3. All applicants must provide a financial analysis of school operations with a three-year projection.
4. All applications must be reviewed by the Interim General Superintendent's staff. Recommendations from staff will be submitted to the Interim General Superintendent between October and April 10th of each year.
5. Applications will be accepted by the Board of Education from the Interim General Superintendent until April 30th of each year. All applications may be approved by the Detroit Board of Education between October and May 31st of each year.
6. All applicants must have building sites or supporting documentation demonstrating that a facility would be available if a charter is granted. Facilities that meet the State facilities code will be given priority for review and recommendation.
7. During the 1997-98 school year, all recommended applications will be presented to the Board no later than April 30th. Beginning in the 1998-99

approval cycle, applications will be reviewed within 60 days from the date of receipt.

8. At least one staff member or a qualified consultant will be employed by the District to assist with the application, review and monitoring process. The funds for this position(s) may not exceed the 3% (by law) of funding received by the Board from the state aid for each public school academy.
9. Each public school academy shall provide a written and oral report including financial information, assessment results, and curriculum development to the Interim General Superintendent and Board once each year.
10. All applications must include and reflect all aspects of public school academy State of Michigan law as reflected in the current Michigan School Code, the current State Aid Act and all Federal laws including, without limitations the following:
