We are pleased to present you with the Annual Education Report (AER) which provides key information on the 2015-2016 educational progress for the Detroit Collegiate Preparatory High School @ Northwestern. The AER addresses the complex reporting information required by federal and state laws. The school's report contains information about student assessment, accountability, and teacher quality. For the 2016-2017 year, no new Priority or Focus schools were named; some Priority or Focus schools did exit their status because they met the exit criteria. New Reward schools were identified using school rankings and Beating the Odds information. A Focus school is one that has a large achievement gap between the highest and lowest achieving 30% of schools. A Priority school is one whose achievement and growth is in the lowest 5% of all schools in the state. A Reward school is one that has achieved one or more of the following distinctions: top 5% of schools on the Top-to-Bottom School Rankings,

top 5% of schools making the greatest gains in achievement (improvement metric), or “Beating the Odds” by outperforming the school’s predicted ranking and/or similar schools. Some schools are not identified with any of these labels. In these cases, no label is given. Our school was identified as a Priority school.

The key challenges for our school are as follows:

We did not test 95% of our students.

Only 82.30% of the All Students; 82.30% of the African American 81.11% of the Economically Disadvantaged and 82.35% of the Students with Disabilities subgroups were assessed in English Language Arts.

Only 84.96% of the All Students; 84.96% of the African American 84.44% of the Economically Disadvantaged and 91.18% of the Students with Disabilities subgroups were assessed in mathematics.

Only 80.70 of the All Students; 80.70% of the African American 80.22% of the Economically Disadvantaged and 86.57% of the Students with Disabilities subgroups were assessed in science.

Only 84.21% of the All Students; 84.21% of the African American 83.52% of the Economically Disadvantaged and 88.57% of the Students with Disabilities subgroups were assessed in social studies.

We did not attain Differentiated target achievement goals for all subgroups of students in English Language Arts.

Only 0.00% of the Bottom 30% subgroup met the Differentiated target in English Language Arts.

We did not attain Differentiated target achievement goals for all subgroups of students in mathematics.

Only 13.79% All Students; 0.00% of the Bottom 30%; 13.79% of the African American and 14.71% of the Economically Disadvantaged subgroups met the Differentiated target in mathematics.

We did not attain Differentiated target achievement goals for all subgroups of students in science.

We did not attain Differentiated target achievement goals for all subgroups of students in science.

We did not attain Differentiated target achievement goals for all subgroups of students in social studies.

Only 9.09% of the All Students; 0.00% of the Bottom 30%; 9.09% of the African American and 8.70% of the Economically Disadvantaged subgroups met the Differentiated target in social studies.

We are actively working to address our Michigan School Scorecard issues, accelerate student achievement and close persistent gaps in achievement by implementing the following key initiatives:

Detroit Collegiate Preparatory High School at Northwestern (DCP@NW) is actively working to address our Michigan Accountability status, accelerate student achievement and close persistent gaps in achievement. As stated in the School Improvement Plan, our school is positioned to improve our Top to Bottom ranking by providing additional support to all students in ELA and Mathematics throughout the school year. We will do this by providing support classes for ELA and Mathematics as supported by Johns Hopkins University; ELA and mathematics Title I teachers for students in the lowest 30% of achievement; and AP courses for students that are excelling. We will also use the Instructional Learning Cycle to assess, analyze, and implement effective instruction for all students in the content areas. As a Priority School, we will maximize Wayne RESA support with coaches in all content disciplines. In the same light, we will use Marzano's Learning Sciences International (consultants to provide teacher support to increase instructional best practices and strategies to reach rigorous standards in all content disciplines). As a Diplomas Now School (our reform model), DCP@NW, will use the following change agents to support our Accountability targets, participation and graduation rate goals by maximizing resources from John Hopkins University with Talent Development Secondary (for organizational support), City Year (for tutoring and mentoring), and Communities in Schools (aligning student/parent need with community resources). DCP@NW will continue to encourage high achievement with dual enrollment, college and career emphasis throughout instruction, and enhancing partnerships. Some of our other partners are Upward Bound, C2 Pipeline Wayne County Community College, Lawrence Technological University, UAW Ford, Henry Ford Medical Center, Wayne State University, and Central Michigan University. (e.g.). We will also provide credit recovery options, extended school year and support summer school/afterschool enrollment

We are actively working to address our attendance and assessment participation challenges. Therefore, improving student attendance and truancy prevention is a priority for our school. We have incorporated the Early Warning Indicators Program to provide support for those students that are having difficulties with their attendance, behavior and academic performance. In addition, to increase student achievement, we implemented in the fall of 2016, smaller learning academies. We will work with students, parents, the community, business partners and stakeholders to improve student attendance. By using

the above-mentioned resources Detroit Collegiate Preparatory High School at Northwestern will meet and/or exceed our academic and attendance goals we have set forth.

Parent Involvement

Parent involvement at Detroit Collegiate Preparatory High School at Northwestern is a very important component to accomplish our goals relative to student achievement. We have dedicated a Dean of Climate and Culture to coordinate parental involvement and community resources. The Dean and the site coordinator for Communities in Schools (CIS) (a trained social worker charged with identifying student/parent need, based upon qualitative and quantitative data, with community resources), will work with the Detroit Parent Network to ensure a robust Parent Advisory Counsel and Student Association (PACSA) organization by providing regular events and activities throughout the school year. (e.g. workshops on college enrollment, parenting strategies, conferences). In addition, the school will provide parents with the opportunity to stay informed of their child's progress by subscribing to Parent Connect and attending conferences with teachers throughout the school year. DCP@NW will celebrate students and parents with various student activities (e.g. honors/awards, literacy and math nights, student performances, and Alumni support).

Process for Assigning Pupils to the Schools

Open Enrollment Initiative

Detroit Public Schools Community District has an "Open Enrollment Initiative." This initiative allows students to elect to attend any Detroit Public School Community District school without being required to live within the boundary for that school. The "Open Enrollment Initiative" does not apply to the Examination High Schools or Application Schools. Parents may enroll their child(ren) in the school of their interest as long as the school has not reached capacity for their particular grade. Enrollment preference is given to students who live within the boundary of a school. It should also be noted that transportation will not be provided for students who select a school outside of the boundary of their home school. Application Schools

Detroit Public Schools Community District has twenty-two (22) schools that require an application for enrollment. Families can apply during the application process window.

Application Schools (Continued)

Applications are open to families of current Detroit Public Schools Community District students as well as those newly enrolling or attending school elsewhere. The District uses one application for its Application Schools. Please note requirements on the application for submission of report cards, test data, transcripts, essay and Grade Point Average information. Schools also may have other individual entry requirements. Be prepared to provide behavior reports.

Examination High Schools

During the Examination High Schools application window, all 8th grade students attending public and non-public schools are eligible to apply for admission to the 9th grade at Cass Technical High School, Renaissance High School and Martin Luther King, Jr. Senior High School's Mathematics, Science and Applied Technology (MSAT) and Center for International Studies and Commerce programs. Residency is not required. During the beginning of the school year, students must complete and submit an application to take the placement examination.

Students must submit an application to be eligible to take the examination. Completed applications and all required documents must be submitted to the student's current school or the Detroit Public Schools' Office of Research and Assessment. Detroit Public Schools Community Districts' students who submit an application will test at their middle school. Non-Detroit Public Schools Community Districts' students who submit an application will be notified of their testing date and location by mail. Applications may be mailed.

The instructional strategies and grade level expectations are aligned to the Michigan Department of Education standards (science and social studies) and Common Core State Standards (mathematics and English language arts). This represents the core curriculum for Detroit Public Schools Community District which is supported by the texts, materials, computer software and other school level resources used daily in the classrooms. All of the professional development activities are aligned to the core curriculum and/or standards. The implementation is a process delineated in the District Academic Plan at: (<http://detroitk12.org/content/wp-content/uploads/2016/11/ACADEMIC-PLAN-Executive-Summary-FINAL-2.pdf>). This plan serves as the framework for each school's academic achievement plan. The frequent monitoring of the implementation of these plans are conducted by the school diagnostic visits, review of the benchmark assessments, use of the teacher evaluation tool and adherence to the pacing calendar. The public may access the core curriculum via our public website www.detroitk12.org and then click on the link to the individual academic offices.

Parents/Guardians are offered classes through Parent University to increase parenting skills, early childhood literacy, adult literacy and GED. During the school year, the Parent Resource Centers are a valuable resource that allow parents and other community members to participate in regular and on-going informational and participatory sessions focused on curriculum and instruction. The Detroit Public Schools Community District Hub, Web up-dates and semi-annual progress reports are a means to disseminate achievement information to educators.

The Detroit Public Schools Community Districts' Office of Research and Assessment has developed a data collection system which has enabled the District to comply with the Annual Education Report criteria of identifying the number and percent of students represented by parents at Parent-Teacher Conferences (PTC).

- 1.0 Data from the PTC Forms represent "parent interactions" with teachers, per school, per card marking.
- 2.0 Parent Interaction Definition: During Parent-Teacher Conferences (and in some instances school open houses) Schools/Teachers are advised to have each parent participant provide a parent signature-a parent may not sign for a student if they did not talk about that student.
- 3.0 Some Detroit Public Schools Community District had a very high percentage of reported parent interactions. This may be due to a number of reasons. In at least two (2) instances, the calculated percentages are in excess of 100%. In each instance, each of these two (2) schools may have experienced a large parent turnout at each of the required conferences. If during each conference, one (1) parent with two (2) students enrolled in the school visited three (3) teachers for each of their two (2) students, this would count as six (6) parent interactions, thus increasing the base number and resulting percentage.
